



# **Sneak Preview: New COL and HS Home**

First, let's review a little of the history between City of Light and Hotlanta Squares. City of Light, formerly First Metropolitan Community Church (FMCC), has been around for many years but in their current location on Tullie Road since 1993. When Hotlanta Squares first organized in August of 2001 (just a few weeks before 9/11) our members met in each others' homes for the first few months. We then partnered with FMCC and have been in their facility ever since. Our partnership is approaching 15 years.

Recently FMCC decided to change its name to City of Light which, they feel, better encapsulates their outreach into the community. They are still an MCC congregation, but the church is only a part of the broader scope of the City of Light community. And their new headquarters on Presidential Parkway will reflect that broader scope, resembling more of a community center than a traditional church.

As we all no doubt know by now, Children's Hospital of Atlanta has been buying up land around Tullie Road, I-85 and North Druid Hills Road for the past couple of years, with plans to greatly expand their operations in the area. The offer was too good to refuse for City of Light and they began looking for a new home. The first deal fell through but they soon found a suitable building which they subsequently purchased, but corporate investors were also interested and made yet another offer that couldn't be passed up. Well, third time's a charm and the new Presidential Parkway location is truly awesome. First of all, it's about three times the size of the Tullie Road location, so there is plenty of room for the church and the partner organizations with plenty of elbow room to spare.

The structure is a large three story red-brick office building near I-85 and Chamblee Tucker Road in the shadow of "Spaghetti Junction". The parking lot is more than double the size of the existing location's and is not shared with other businesses. It has a gate and can be fitted with security cameras. The church will occupy most of the first floor and this is where our dance space will also be located. COL's offices will be on the second floor and the third floor will have office space that can be used by other partner organizations. -Continued on next page-


There will be a few steps down from the parking lot to the main entrance but it will also be handicap accessible. The entrance will open into a reception hall with an information desk on the right. At the rear of the hallway, double doors will open into the church sanctuary. On the left side of the hallway will be the Friendship Room (or as many churches call it a "fellowship" hall). This large open space will have restrooms, a water fountain and a snack bar directly off of it and will also be adjacent to the main kitchen. This space should be large enough to accommodate eight or more squares and should be sufficient for our Monday and Tuesday classes and all but the largest of our dance events.

Across the hall from the Friendship Room will be Troy Perry Hall, which will be an even larger space designed for banquets and wedding receptions. This space could possibly hold twelve or more squares and could accommodate our largest dance events, and possibly even our annual fly-in. The planned flooring for both rooms will be a high-quality vinyl plank which will not only be attractive and durable, it will be perfect for dancing and much easier on the ankles and knees than the slate tile we are dancing on now.

The church is planning to begin Sunday services in the new facility on October 2<sup>nd</sup> and Hotlanta Squares' first regular classes in the new location will begin on Monday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> and Tuesday, October 4<sup>th</sup>. As you can see from these photos, there is much work still to be done, so keep your fingers crossed that all goes according to plan and we are able to stick to this schedule.

I hope you are all as excited as I am to begin this new chapter in our club's history. These last few weeks in the Tullie Road facility will be bittersweet as 15 years of memories come flooding back, but as we forge ahead we have a lot of new experiences to look forward to and new memories to make in our beautiful new home.

# Caller's Corner: Angels or Devils

Angels (or Devils?)



There's a tradition in square dancing where experienced dancers come to classes to dance with new students and help them learn by keeping things moving and keeping the squares functioning so it's easier to see how a call works and what their final These dancers are called position should be. "angels". If you ask any caller how they feel about dancers "angeling" their classes you're likely to get completely different opinions ranging from "love them" to "hate them." For some, the angels are just there to fill squares and are forbidden from explaining calls, or even pushing/guiding dancers to the correct position. For others, angels are a part of teaching new dancers how to dance. Callers are just standing up front with a mic and can only verbally explain how things are done. The angels are hands on and can help with many of the little things, like hand holds and styling, the more

As a new caller, I can't keep eyes on every square, I can hardly keep track of the one right in front of me, so I'm relying on having some good angels in the squares. Also, our club is unique in that we don't have a weekly "club night" for dancers to come and dance a level they've completed. If we want practice, we have to come to class and dance with the new students each week. Clubs who have weekly dance nights get regular practice, but also have a terrible time recruiting angels to help with classes. We have an overabundance of angels, which is good... and sometimes bad.

Let me (IMHO [for those who speak IM]) explain what makes a good angel and what makes a bad angel (or devil!).

- A good angel executes a call in the manner being taught (save the shortcuts for dances) with the proper styling and finishes in the correct position even if a student is slow to respond or makes a mistake.

It's important to do the call correctly and finish in the correct position, leaving an empty dance slot, if necessary, that the student can see and move to. It's nearly impossible to learn calls if the square isn't functioning. So if the angels are not paying attention, going overboard with extraneous dance moves or conversation, distracting the other dancers, then you are clearly not helping and need to keep it in check. It's OK to have fun, but if new dancers are in your square just make sure you're not being a distraction.

Also, if you're still missing calls at that level, then you are still a student of that level and not an angel. We expect the new dancers to make mistakes, not the experienced ones.

A good angel can help explain a call and can demonstrate how something is done (preferably between tips).

I think a lot of callers do not want dancers teaching calls in the square. I don't have a problem with it, as long as you are explaining the correct moves and definitions. Sometimes getting a different explanation can really help someone, and demonstrating a call can also make things much clearer. But there is probably no worse sin than giving someone the wrong information. If there's any doubt, whatsoever, how to do a call, then the best thing to do is defer to the caller or someone who definitely knows what's correct.

In summary, this being my first time teaching these classes, I need the help that good angels can provide to the new dancers. And since we are a club who primarily gets their floor time in by attending weekly classes, we are going to have all levels of experience in the squares each week. Let's keep in mind that there are dancers, in each class, taking it for the first time, and they need support and help from the experienced dancers. Use judgment and discretion if there are new dancers in your square and if you can't be an angel, that's fine, at least don't be a devil.

# How To Grow Our Club

At the IAGSDC convention meeting there were 5 clubs who grew by more than 15%. Bloomin Squares grew 38%. (They are in the L. A. area, and like us, they have Pride in October. They are planning Mainstream classes for January and a big advertising blitz in November and December). South Florida Mustangs also grew by 38% (they work in conjunction with a gay church's fundraiser offering free "entertainment" kind of like our open houses where anyone can dance), Cuesta Squares in San Luis Obispo grew 25 % by attracting new through advertising regional dancers publications. Spin City squares grew by 21% and The Wilde Bunch grew by 16%.

In addition to these fastest growing clubs, there were 3 clubs who have more than 100 members. They are Chi Town Squares, Puddletown Squares and Rocky Mountain Rainbows. These clubs will likely continue to grow.

## How do we grow? Recruitment!

First of all we have five or six new dancers who are taking the mainstream class. We need to focus on giving them the encouragement, attention and the amount of floor time they need to progress.

# How do we grow? Retention!

We currently have 82 members. How do we retain them? By keeping them "hooked" into the social aspects of our club and giving them opportunities to "dance their level." Non-dancing social events such as PALS Bingo and Bowling and Game nights are a good way to do this. We need to remind our members that we miss them when they are absent from a weekly class or dance. For many of us, this club is our main group of friends, and for some of us this club is our family. If your family member missed a family gathering, wouldn't you want to know why?

# How do we grow? Reinstatement!

For various reasons through the years, people have drifted away. Sometimes it is because of differences in club direction or leadership or even the caller. Sometimes it is because of a temporary

health condition or that of a spouse or other family member. Now is the time to reach out to those in our community to see if conditions have changed to make it possible for them to come back and dance with us and renew their membership.

Our club reported 70 members to the IAGSDC in April as our official membership. Since then we have grown to 82 members, so we are definitely headed in the right direction. Through Recruitment, Retention and Reinstatement, we can increase our membership.

How does 10% sound as a very achievable goal for growth? If we could get eight new or returning members by April 2017,. that will give us a membership count of 90, reflecting a club growth of 28% since April 2016. This would put us in the group of fastest growing clubs in the IAGSDC by our 2017 convention in Palm Springs. Let's do this!

# Hot Tips Tip Of The Month: Boat Packing Advice



Remember the 4 P's

One of the most popular calls in the Plus level of dancing is "Load The Boat". It's one of the most fun calls in all of square dancing and one of the more complicated. I remember when I was first learning Plus, I struggled with this call, particularly the "inside" part. Then, someone taught me the trick of the 4 P's and I haven't had a lick of trouble with the call since. The rule of the 4 P's applies to both the inside and the outside parts.

For the inside part it is:

Pass Through

Pivot away from your partner

Partner Trade

Pass Through

For the outside part it is:

**P**romenade individually around the outside **P**ass one

Pass two and then three Pivot in (Quarter in)

I hope this helps.




